Joseph Williams received a certificate for completing core requirements and becoming a certified county commissioner. Training certificates were awarded at the 2014 Legislative Leadership Conference at the Classic Center in Athens-Clarke County.

Course offerings in the ACCG Lifelong Learning Academy began in 2013. The Lifelong Learning Academy allows commissioners to receive a specialty certification after they complete core requirements. In addition, they have the opportunity to attend continuing education sessions at various ACCG conferences and meetings. Since its inception, the program has been redesigned to continue to offer county commissioners exceptional learning experiences.

ACCG and the Vinson Institute have worked in partnership to provide leadership development and training certification programs for county commissioners and county staff for more than two decades. These training programs are voluntary, but encourage lifelong learning and offer educational opportunities that further develop an understanding of county governance and keep county officials updated on current trends and management practices. Education and training opportunities are afforded at all ACCG conferences and events. Training opportunities range from the typical classroom setting to speeches and updates from state officials and industry experts. Over 2,600 county officials have received certification from these programs.
